To learn the characteristics of family engagement and the conditions that support effective home-school partnerships for literacy

Our school has a family-school partnership system that is based on principles of equity and bi-directional communication for reading development of the family's child.

Communication and materials are accessible to all families and translated into languages spoken by families in the school. Translators are available and used as needed.

Communication with families includes opportunities for all families to communicate in a variety of ways that are most accessible to them – written, verbal, in person, with a translator, etc.

To learn what family engagement may look like in a system of literacy support and services, like a Multi-tiered System of Support for Reading (MTSS-R)

Our school's family-school partnership system focused on reading development provides for multiple and varied opportunities for all families to learn what MTSS-R is, why it is being used, and how their child is being supported within our school's MTSS-R system.

Our school's family-school partnership system focused on reading development provides for multiple and varied opportunities for all families to receive written and verbal updates on the reading progress of their child, with data and examples specific to their child. Written updates include family-friendly explanations with text and graphs appropriate for families. Verbal interactions include opportunities for asking questions, discussing the child's reading progress, and collectively planning what can be done to further improve the child's reading development.

Our school's family-school partnership system focused on reading development provides for multiple and varied opportunities for all families to support reading instruction and intervention in school, either for multiple children (e.g., working with small groups of children in a group or individually) or specifically with their child (e.g., reading with their child in school).

Our family–school partnership focused on reading development includes a systematic process whereby our school supports all families in engaging their child to learn and practice reading.

Communication in the family–school partnership centers on the joint sharing of information regarding the reading development of the family's child.

Learning opportunities include culturally responsive materials, activities, and information that appropriately reflect the diversity of families in our school.

Our family-school partnership includes direct opportunities for all families to learn, practice, and give and receive feedback on ways to support children's reading development.

To learn how our language system works to listen, speak, read, and write well

Our school's family-school partnership system focused on reading development provides for multiple and varied opportunities for all families to understand reading development, how children learn to read, why children struggle with reading, and signs of risk for reading difficulties.
